JOINING HANDS - CELEBRATES TEN YEARS

In 2006, I wrote in our first newsletter:

The restoration work we have accomplished, since Hurricane Katrina hit the Mississippi coast in August 2005, continues to amaze me. We started in January 2006 with a thought, could we adopt a family? Could we tell them that we would do everything we could to get them back into their home? And after making the commitment, could we follow through with volunteers and financial support?

When I wrote those words I was thinking short-term; one to two years, then our work would be done. Volunteers would stop arriving; funds would stop supporting. I certainly could not imagine Joining Hands still being strong after ten years. Since that hot January in Biloxi Mississippi, Joining Hands has restored homes in Mississippi, Texas, Louisiana, Georgia, New Jersey, North Carolina, and Maryland. A total of 490 people have offered their hands, hearts and talents to assist those with no financial means to move back into their homes. Each year I'm amazed at what's achieved.

The story of Joining Hands seems impossible to believe. But my words from 2006 continue to ring true: Early in 2006 I learned a lesson in regards to coordinating a restoration project — I learned not to worry. This has been God's project since the beginning and if Joining Hands is to continue — then Volunteers and financial donations will keep coming, as I believe they will.

As we begin our second decade, climate trends indicate there will be no shortage of work. And if we follow God's lead, the Joining Hands mission will continue. Aging volunteers will be replaced with younger, more flexible folks; new churches will answer the call to financially support our projects; different Rotary clubs will adopt Joining Hands as a service project. We only need to keep our hearts open to the call.

Joining Hands recently returned to Crisfield Maryland to continue the work of restoring homes severely damaged by Storm Sandy. The storm struck on October 3rd, 2012. Long-term recovery, under the leadership of Ben Botti and Gordy Taylor from the United Methodist Committee on Relief's (UMCOR) Pen-Del Conference, started the following Spring. Since that time, 212 homes have been refurbished through the talents of over 3,000 volunteers. Funding for the projects came from the American Red Cross (\$500,000 grant), UMCOR (\$500,000 grant), and Volunteer donations (\$150,000).

Over a four-week period in September and October, 64 Joining Hands volunteers worked on three different homes. Skilled workers were needed in Carol's home. After UMCOR determined Carol's eligibility for services, it was discovered that the house had extensive termite and electrical damage. Joining Hands volunteers installed a new electrical system and removed and rebuilt an outside wall and windows. Work began on an interior section of the home, installing drywall/mudding, painting, and flooring so that Carol could return home.

Shirley's home was almost finished when Joining Hands arrived. Volunteers removed the kitchen floor and replaced it with new laminate flooring. A recent widow, Shirley is the son of Gordy Taylor.

Mary and Monte, retirees, needed new insulation and drywall. With no complaints, volunteers Bill Chicoski and Barb Landis worked under the house for two days to install vapor barrier, crawling around on oyster shells with a 12"-24" head clearance.

Our primary project was Pastor Pat and Ray's home. This couple lived in northeastern Pennsylvania and traveled to Crisfield two times after the storm to work on homes. Ray has extensive experience in home renovations and recently retired. They fell in love with the town and its people and Pat felt inspired to move to Crisfield. They packed up their possessions and moved without a pastoral appointment or a place to live. Pat accepted a part-time call at two small Methodist churches and, without any equity of their own, bought this severely-damaged home in July. Ray's intention was to complete all work himself, but the magnitude of the project was overwhelming. Joining Hands worked inside the home, hanging drywall/mudding/sanding, painting, installing cabinets and completing necessary miscellaneous carpentry work. Ray was on the site most days, quietly offering his assistance and guidance, "It was a great moment when the first piece of drywall went up".


